About the Collection

Number of works:

Around 160,000

Type of works:

Woodcuts, copperplate engravings, etchings, lithographs, drawings, photographs, multiples

Background information

Oldest work:	Anonymous, single-page woodcut, around 1450
Newest work:	David Hominal, <i>Sans Titre</i> , 2016, colour lithograph on vellum, 56.5 x 76.4 cm
First large group of works acquired:	208 sheets of European artwork from the 16th –18th century, from the collection of painter Johann Rudolf Bühlmann (acquired: 1870)
Last work acquired:	Baltensperger + Siepert, <i>Imaginary Landscapes</i> , 2015, 12 collages [C-Print on Fujicolor Crystal Archive], diverse materials
Largest work:	Bruno Murer, <i>Flug über den Atlantik</i> , 1999, [Leporello], 69.5 x 998 cm
Smallest work:	Anonymous, 15th century, <i>Der Heilige Sebastian und der Heilige Christophorus mit dem Christuskind</i> , diameter 2.8 cm
